The Awards

In 2004, Oklahoma faced a shocking grade in the State Board of Health's annual study that evaluates Oklahoma on key health indicators. Between 1990 and 2002, Oklahoma was the only state that saw a drop in overall health. Oklahoma had taken a big step backward and its residents had become less healthy.

The Champions of Health awards were launched that year with the idea that Oklahoma can do better. The program recognizes those that are performing innovative work that can be replicated in other communities throughout the state. Champions of Health seeks to "move the needle" by forming partnerships to help solve Oklahoma's health issues. Over a span of 18 years, nearly 200 individuals and organizations have been recognized for their efforts to improve the health of Oklahomans.

The Champions of Health awards are about more than recognition. Nonprofit award winners receive a grant to help them further their mission, and gala proceeds benefit the Oklahoma Caring Foundation. To learn more, visit **championsofhealth.org**

The Oklahoma Caring Foundation

The mission of the Oklahoma Caring Foundation, Inc. is to support programs that provide Oklahomans access to preventive health services. Established in 1994, the 501(c)3 organization is funded by community contributions and administered by Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Oklahoma as an in-kind donation.

Since 1999, the Foundation's Oklahoma Caring Van Program has provided basic childhood immunizations, at no charge, to qualifying Oklahoma children from birth to age 18. For more than 20 years, its Caring Vans have provided more than 216,000 children with over 363,000 vaccinations. The Oklahoma Caring Van Program operates nine mobile units that eliminate barriers to care including transportation, cost and time. Additional preventive health services were added to the program in 2012, including oral health screenings, diabetes screenings and wellness education. Brooke Shields is an actress, model, and author that has spent her life in the spotlight.

Shields began her modeling career at 11 months old and was the youngest fashion model to grace the cover of Vogue magazine. She rapidly rose to fame appearing in films "Pretty Baby," "Blue Lagoon" and "Endless Love."

Shields has maintained a successful and acclaimed television career, including her starring role in

"Suddenly Susan." Shields made her Broadway debut as Rizzo in the hit musical "Grease," and has starred in "Chicago," "Wonderful Town," "Cabaret" and "The Addams Family."

Her 2006 best-selling memoir, "Down Came the Rain," details her struggles with post-partum depression. Her 2014 follow-up, "There Was a Little Girl," is a candid look at her relationship with her mother, who was both her manager and an alcoholic.

Shields is a happily married mother of two daughters and is a strong advocate for women's issues and keeping the arts alive in schools.

Champion of Children's Health - Winner

Anna's House Foundation

Anna's House Foundation (AHF) is a faith-based organization whose mission is to provide immediate, stable and loving homes for Oklahoma's children in state custody. AHF desires to offer a future of hope and faith to foster children and families by providing housing, support, training, and resources in a Christian community setting. AHF provides an exceptional, personal network of support for families in Oklahoma County and contingent counties caring for children in foster care, and the unique needs children share. Children enter into foster care when a judge determines it is no longer safe for them to remain with their caregiver, often their parents. While biological parents work a court ordered plan, children are temporarily placed in a foster care home. The goal of foster care is for children to reunite with their parents. In certain cases, adoption may occur.

Counseling & Recovery Services of Oklahoma CALM Center

The CALM Center is a safe and caring place for youth ages 10-17 to receive immediate support, assessment and stabilization for an emotional, behavioral or substance abuse crisis any time, day or night. Care is provided regardless of ability to pay, and a referral is not necessary. A board and ASAM certified psychiatrist along with licensed nurses, therapists and life skills coaches work as a team with youth and their families to identify what is causing the crisis and to create a plan for change. The CALM Center fills the gap between outpatient and inpatient care for kids in crisis.

Champion of Senior Health - Winner

LIFE Senior Services

LIFE Senior Services has provided programs, facilities, and services to meet the needs of older adults across the continuum of care with choices since 1973. The greater Tulsa community is unique in having a nonprofit senior service provider that integrates and links a comprehensive group of resources under one organization. One of LIFE's most utilized programs is SeniorLink, which helps LIFE Senior Services assist seniors with optimum efficiency. The programs within SeniorLink (LIFE EDU, Case Management and Behavioral Health, Caregiver Support Services, and SeniorLine) collaboratively serve seniors and caregivers with vital home and community-based resources. While SeniorLink has long been LIFE Senior Services' most called-upon resource, the COVID-19 crisis created an increase in volume and broader scope of needs.



Champion of Senior Health - Finalist

Areawide Aging Agency

Since 1974, Areawide Aging Agency has been dedicated to advancing the dignity and independence of older adults in Canadian, Cleveland, Logan, and Oklahoma counties. Areawide coordinates the services needed to stabilize seniors by addressing nutritional needs, wellness education, and combatting depression associated with isolation. Services are provided to anyone over the age of 60, with a focus on those most vulnerable. When it is no longer safe to remain in their home, Areawide's Ombudsman program advocates on behalf of the residents of nursing homes.

Champion of the Uninsured - Winner

Health Outreach Prevention Education, Inc. (H.O.P.E.)

H.O.P.E.'s mission is to create a healthier community by providing outreach and clinic services focused on HIV, Sexually Transmitted Infections (STI), Hepatitis C (HCV) prevention, education, counseling, testing, and referrals to medical care and social services for those who test positive. H.O.P.E.'s IMPACT program is the only HIV, STI and HCV prevention program in Oklahoma that targets the rural areas to provide services to at-risk and uninsured individuals. This innovative program uses social media and dating apps to raise awareness about HIV, STIs, and HCV, as well as reduce the stigma associated with seeking testing and treatment services. H.O.P.E. meets clients where they are via an outreach testing van to provide testing and prevention education services. Services are provided free of charge.



Champion of the Uninsured - Finalist

Brendon McLarty Memorial Foundation

Brendon McLarty Memorial Foundation's mission is to honor the life of Brendon McLarty by fighting asthma through awareness and education. There is no cure for asthma, but it can be managed with proper prevention and treatment. Senate Bill 381 allows schools in Oklahoma to stock a centrally located rescue inhaler to use if a child suffers from respiratory distress. To date, 10 school districts have implemented stock inhalers. The Foundation is actively raising money to purchase inhalers and disposable spacers for all schools across the state of Oklahoma.

Community Health Champion – Winner

Family & Children's Services COPES 911

What if when someone calls 911 and says, "I want to kill myself," there was a crisis therapist they could talk to? The Family & Children's Services (F&CS) COPES 911 program has placed such experts in Tulsa's 911 Dispatch Center, allowing dispatchers to connect callers in psychiatric distress to crisis therapists. 911 centers are traditionally structured with responders from each main discipline housed in one, large room. Now, at least for Tulsa's 911, they can transfer mental health distress calls directly to a trained and licensed F&CS COPES expert. Callers will talk with an appropriate professional F&CS mental health expert who, when possible, will de-escalate and stabilize the crisis over the phone. For more urgent situations requiring an on-site crisis response, F&CS' COPES mobile crisis team, and/or other first responders may be dispatched to the caller's location.

Hospitality House of Tulsa

Hospitality House of Tulsa is a Christian faith-based nonprofit organization providing medical lodging and support services to patients and families traveling to Tulsa for medical care. Its mission is to offer a home away from home for families caring for loved ones in medical crisis. While providing lodging, meals, prayer support, and transportation assistance, Hospitality House can successfully measure the positive impact its mission plays in the patients' and caregivers' medical experience. In 2021, Hospitality House of Tulsa is celebrating 15 years of serving more than 7,300 families from all 77 counties in Oklahoma, 48 states, and 8 foreign countries.

Corporate Health Champion - Winner

Paycom

Paycom is an employee-centric organization that prioritizes the well-being and health of team members and is proud to offer an excellent health and benefits program to employees and their families. Throughout the pandemic, the company promoted health through a walking challenge, at-home fitness classes and mental health initiatives. Paycom's mental wellness program and resources are there to provide support and promote health for employees. Whether a team member is caring for a loved one, navigating a pregnancy, anxious about returning to work or just needs someone to listen, Paycom's robust wellness resources are there to help. The individual or organization recognized by this award has made a major and lasting contribution to the improvement of statewide health. This award is presented to the entry judged to be the most unique and effective approach to improve Oklahoma health.
